HISTORY OF THE UKRAINIAN NATIONAL HALL IN GLENDON Submitted by Sandra Yuschyshyn

In the early nineteen hundreds before the first world war many people settled in the district known as Nowa Bukowina (Gifford), Beacon, Glendon and Therein. The majority were of the Ukrainian Greek Orthodox faith.

They bought a parcel of land for a grave site and a future church building.

The church was registered as Orthodox Greek Oriental Church of Saints Peter and Paul at Nowa Bukowina in the Province of Alberta's, Dominion of Canada.

The Church building was built and the first Divine Liturgy was held on 1920, Green Holidays (Zelanie Sviata).

As more Ukrainians moved into the Glendon area the people realized they needed a larger building for worship and gatherings.

In 1936 the Ukrainian National Hall (Marodni Dhim) was built in Glendon to serve as a church and hall.

The building burned down in October 1936 the night before the first church service and blessing was to be celebrated, arson was suspected but never proven.

In 1937 a new hall was built on the same lot. Later land was purchased for a church building where Glendon Holy Trinity Church is at today.

In March of 1945 the first priest Reverend Bill Seneshen, his wife and a son and daughter arrived in Glendon. With Fr Bill's guidance and organizing skills and the church members enthusiasm and the need, the

History continued:

Glendon Holy Trinity Ukrainian Greek Orthodox church contrustuction started in the summer of 1945.

In November 1945, before the church construction was completed the second Ukrainian National Hall burned down. Again arson was suspected but never proven.

In 1947 the third new Ukrainian National Hall building, 40ft X 60ft with a full basement was constructed using bricks.

The Ukrainian National Hall being the largest building in town was used for many years, for weddings, bingo's, banquets, meetings etc.

When the Glendon School acquired a gymnasium, in 1967-68, and the RCMP HALL was built in 1973, the Ukrainian National Hall was no longer needed.

For a few years the Ukrainian Nation Hall was an appliance sales and repair shop, and even a pool hall.


After the sale of the Hall the proceeds were invested.

Throughout the history of the Ukrainian National Hall, Nowa Bukowina Church members were always a very large part of the construction and maintenance of the hall. As a result of this involvement, the Holy Trinity Church members have decided to give Nowa Bukowina Church, a gift of \$25,000.00.

The "Reach" Project

Our Bonnyville and District Ukrainian
Orthodox Parishes have embraced a theme
for 2015 is to help focus our churches' vision,
plans, and activities for the coming year.
The theme is "Reach" and involves three
important elements of our Orthodox faith.
These three work best, when they are all
working together.

1. Reach Up

Reach up refers to our own spiritual development and relationship with God ... what we can do to continue to grow as a Christians. Reach up also involves how we worship - how we grow through participation in the fullness of different church services.

2. Reach In

The second important part of our church life is how we support and nurture each other. All churches have faithful: young, old, women, men, single, married. How do we reach in to each other's lives to help each other? To visit those who are sick or shut in? To provide support to families after death or loss? To welcome a new family? To encourage, teach, and include children? To socialize with each other?

3. Reach Out

Reaching out has several meanings:

- Doing "good works" in the community food bank drive or other charity projects.
- Evangelizing bringing people to our faith. Being welcoming and inclusive.
- Insuring that we are known in the larger community, and that we participate, as a church, in events.

THE REACH PROJECT:

The first part of The Reach Project is, "Reach Up". What exactly does this mean? Reach Up refers to our own spiritual development and relationship with God. We can reach up to the Lord by inviting Him into our hearts, taking time to get to know and love Him, and trying to follow his path.

As Romans 8:28 states,

"And we know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose."

Things that we can do *individually* to **Reach Up** include:

- Read the Bible His good news. The more we know and understand the scriptures, the better we can apply it to our daily lives. The Bible teaches us powerful life lessons about love, kindness, humility, and our path to salvation.
- Attend Bible Study; try a self-directed study; or start an Orthodox book club.
- Perhaps go to a retreat, such as the Orthodox Men's and Women's retreats that are held annually in Caroline, Alberta.
- Attend and participate in the fullness of Church Services and partake in the eucharist.
- Have a Prayer Corner in our homes and pray as a family.
- Make the sign of the cross and say short, daily prayers... of thanks, before starting a task, before leaving on a trip, for a sick friend, for guidance, for forgiveness... God is waiting to have a conversation with you!
- Volunteer for a task that needs to be done in the church: from being a Sunday School teacher, cleaning candle stands, taking care of linens, bringing gifts of food, to reading the Epistle, and serving on Church Executives and Committees. We grow, not by being by-standers, but by being involved in our Churches. What gifts/talents can you bring to your Church/the District?

THE REACH PROJECT CONTINUED:

As a District and Church family, we can also **Reach Up** by:

- 1. Hosting Spiritual Workshops. Perhaps holding a family a spiritual retreat at Kiev's-K-Hi Camp. Inviting the women of the District to come together once or twice a year for an event.
- 2. Travelling to all 6 Churches in our District to attend services regularly, so that we can pray, sing, worship, and learn about our faith together.
- 3. Talking to Fr. Peter and asking questions perhaps we could have a 5 minute question/answer session after each Liturgy. Inquiring minds!

Reaching Up is something that we all **can** do. The Lord is always close by:

"They should seek the Lord in the hope that they might grope (reach) for Him and find Him, though He is not far from each one of us.

Acts17:27

"LOVE powerfully, **GIVE** prayerfully, **LIVE** purposefully, and leave the rest to **GOD**."
