Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ.

Several years ago at a Clergy Retreat, the clergy witnessed a presentation by Fr. Oleh Krawchenko on the role of laity in the Church. It was a wonderful reminder to me as a Priest of my own position and the harmonious nature the Church is meant to have. This month's pastoral article is based upon that presentation.

#### Clergy and Laity - One Calling in Christ

Clergy and Laity are often seen as two distinct and different groups within the Church. Although this may appear to be the case on the surface, the truth is that although they may be distinct they are not at all different. I say this because both the Clergy and Laity have a common goal in their own personal lives and in the life of the Church, and that goal is to lead a Christ centered life. People understand that the role of Clergy is to be a part of the Church on every level, however one must further understand that the Laity should be just as involved, (and thus are no different than Clergy), I will break down the role of the Laity in the Church.

#### Laity in worship

The word Laity comes from the Greek word meaning 'people'. There is nothing negative or opposed to clergy in this term. Laos - We are all people: This term is in fact highly positive and inclusive. This term refers to the people of God, those chosen. The church insists on two sacraments to become members of the Church - Baptism and Chrismation - and everyone who is Baptized and Chrismated into the Orthodox Church is a part of "The Community of Saints". Everyone is at first the "people of God", and as such we are all members of the church. In this way Laity is truly an inclusive word and is a common vocation for all the people God. By virtue of their baptism and Chrismation are people are ordained to the 'Royal Priesthood'. Baptism is the sacrament of regeneration, and Chrismation gives us the seal of the gift of the Holy Spirit. The church refers to each Baptized and Chrismated Christian as the servant of God, and that they are to be an honorable member, a "consecrated vessel", an "heir of God's Kingdom". There is nothing secular about this.

With all this in mind, the questions then is raised "If laity are ordained, what is their role?" It is true that Worship is seen almost exclusively as a clerical field of endeavor. However, it is in worship that the Laity should excel. Laity's participation is indispensable when it come to worship as it is a common worldly action involving all God's people. It is also true that while the bishop or priest may preside over the prayers, those prayers are not the prayers of the clergy presiding. Those payers are the prayers of the church, and the laity are concelebrants in worship with the clergy. Think of how all of our prayer petitions end with the laity singing "Amen", this is done because no prayer is said that does not end with the acceptance and approval of the laity. Our Divine Liturgy is a common action that through dialogue that requires responsible participation from both clergy and laity.

#### Laity in teaching

Laity can teach under the guidance of the local priest who is answerable to his bishop. This is why most Sunday Schools are taught by laity. The Church is responsible for educating Christians about the Faith, however the main education of our faith does not take place in our churches, it takes place in the home. As such, education is not only for children but there is a dire need for adult education as well. This is why it is incumbent on every Christian not simply to wait for the Priest to hold studies, or even rely on said studies alone, but to take their spiritual education into their own hands and invest time into learning and researching the Church and its teachings. Such learning can be achieved in various ways including simply making time to read the bible or comb through the books at your local library – or for those which the technological means, surfing the internet. When in doubt, your priest can suggest some reputable materials. There is a misconception that Theologians (experts on Theology) are always members of the Clergy when in fact, Theologians can be male, female, clergy, or laity. Many members of the Laity who have been educated in theology are brought forth by the bishops to assist the clergy in teaching.

#### Laity in administration:

To discuss the administration of the church two misconceptions must be dispelled:

- 1. The church is not a democracy. Democracy is defined as "of the people, by the people, for the people." As the church is not a worldly entity it does not fit this definition. The Church is "of God, by God, and for the people of God." As such the Church is not "by popular vote".
- 2. The church is not an Autocracy. The church is not ruled by Bishops or Presbyters as if they had no account to give. The welfare of the church should be our common concern and corporate responsibility. We are all responsible for the church and responsible to God!

The ideal way to administer to the Church is through a conciliar system. The church is hierarchical but is it also conciliar. We may respect a bishops authority to make decisions on small matters, but one bishop alone does not make decisions for the entire Church, a council of bishops does. The administrational authority of the Church belongs to the Bishop as the shepherd of his flock. However, the canons require the bishop to consult his elders or constituents, meaning the Clergy and Laity. Laity therefore, have a critically important role to play in administration.

As you can see, the separation between Clergy and Laity is not, and should not, be that far apart from each other. After all, Clergy are those who have been chosen from amongst the Laity, by the Laity, for the ministry to the Laity. In all of us there is a diversity of gifts and a diversity of ministries, but it all comes from the same Lord. Not everyone can be a Teacher, Doctor, Homemaker, Carpenter, Preacher, Minister, etc. But in whatever role we find ourselves, we all find ourselves ministering to and for God.

# **HEALTH WARNING...** Keep going to church over the summer months

"Summer time and the living is easy," as the old Sam Cooke song goes. As soon as the weather gets warmer, our thoughts turn to relaxing, lightening up on the responsibilities of life. School lets out. We take vacations from work. And some put their Church attendance on hiatus until the fall.

The problem with this is that Church is not a responsibility, it is a gift. God gives us worship and the community of the Church as aides to help us grow in His image and likeness. "The Sabbath was made for man, man was not made for the Sabbath", Jesus teaches us.

Like all of life, our spiritual life is lived in a certain rhythm. Over the Church year, with all of its fasts and feasts, a certain momentum is developed in our souls. This momentum is a result of the active presence of the Holy Spirit in us -- guiding our decisions, nourishing our souls, and leading us to a personal communion with our Lord Jesus Christ.

However, a word of warning: if this momentum is not kept up, all that we gain begins to be lost. As a parish priest, I have sadly seen more people than I would like to count who had grown greatly over the winter and spring portions of the Church year, only to fall right back to square one because they took "time off" from church over the summer. The result of their "breather" was a loss of this Spirit-driven momentum (ironically, the Greek word for "breath" also means "spirit"). Like a muscle, when our souls are left inactive they atrophy.

If you are going away this summer, speak with your parish priest and ask him to help you find you the closest Orthodox church. If you are going out to the cabin or on a camping trip, take along a Bible and a prayer book; celebrate the glory of nature with its Creator. Every day is a "day that the Lord has made". Every season, every moment of our lives is a gift from God. Any time is time to spend with the Lord.

Let us not be fooled. Orthodox Christianity is a high-maintenance way of life. To neglect our spiritual lives is to invite the spirits of apathy, sloth and delusion into our hearts. To keep the Faith is to receive an ever-deepening sense of God's presence in our lives.
